SUBJECT

Proposal to create a new CEN/TC 'Nutritional Supplements compatible with doping prevention'

BACKGROUND

On 2016-12-09, AFNOR submitted a proposal to CCMC for the creation of a new Technical Committee with the following proposed title: 'Nutritional Supplements compatible with doping prevention', for which details are provided in Annex 1.

The scope of this proposed Technical Committee would be to develop European Deliverables for nutritional supplements compatible with doping prevention in sport, for consumption by people practising sport as part of a varied and well-balanced diet. Nutritional supplements include food supplements as defined by Directive 2002/46/EC and food products, which target sportspeople.

The programme of work proposed in Annex 1 is based on the need to provide a best-practice framework for nutritional supplements manufacturers enabling them to offer safe products to sportspeople in Europe as recommended by European Commission report on food intended for sportspeople (COM (2016) 402).

By Resolution BT C75/2009, BT decided that both of the following criteria are to be met for acceptance of such a proposal for new work (in a new area):

- A two-thirds majority of the votes cast (abstentions not counted) are in favour of the proposal (or more);
- At least 5 members express commitment to participate.

As a consequence, BT Members are requested to state explicitly, by means of the commenting field provided in the BT-balloting tool, whether or not they are committed to participate in the work.

- Maintenance / disposal

NOTE: 'Immediately affected stakeholders' are considered to be those who, within the context of the proposal, would be in a position to implement the provisions of the intended standard(s) into their products, services or management practices.
